

Abortion Access, Everywhere and for Everyone.

When passed by the U.S. Congress, two landmark bills—the **Women’s Health Protection Act** and the **Equal Access to Abortion Coverage in Health Insurance (EACH) Act**—will transform abortion rights and access across the country—bringing us closer to a world where all people in the U.S. can access and afford abortion care.

In states across the U.S., essential reproductive health

care is being pushed out of reach by state laws that regulate abortion with medically unnecessary restrictions on access and federal bans on abortion coverage like the Hyde Amendment. These restrictions cause the most harm for people who already face significant obstacles to health care, especially for Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC), people working to make ends meet, members of the

LGBTQI+ community, immigrants, young people, those living in rural communities, and people with disabilities.

The **Women’s Health Protection Act (WHPA)** and the **EACH Act** tackle the greatest threats to reproductive health and rights in the U.S. WHPA protects the right to access abortion care and the EACH Act helps ensure care is affordable.

Together, these bills remove barriers to care so that all people—whoever they are or wherever they’re from—can access and afford abortion care.

WHPA

The **Women’s Health Protection Act (WHPA)** protects the right to access abortion care, free from restrictions and bans on abortion—including mandatory delays, biased counseling, two-trip requirements, 6-week, 8-week, 15-week and other bans, and state-mandated ultrasounds.

WHPA would create a statutory right for health care providers to provide abortion care, and a corresponding right for their patients to receive that care, free from medically unnecessary restrictions that single out abortion and impede access.

EACH Act

The **Equal Access to Abortion Coverage in Health Insurance (EACH) Act** stops politicians from interfering with someone’s decision about abortion based on how much they earn or how they’re insured. EACH would reverse the Hyde Amendment and expand insurance coverage for abortion care.

The EACH Act ensures that if someone gets care or insurance through the federal government, they will be covered for pregnancy-related care that includes abortion. It also prohibits political interference with decisions of private health insurance companies to offer coverage for abortion care.
